WHERE THE WORLD OPENS UP

The Accountability Pillar surveys are administered annually and throughout the province, during the months of January to March to:

- Students in Grades 4, 7 and 10;
- Students in Grades 4 through 9 (in small schools);
- Parents of students in Grades 4, 7 and 10; and
- Teachers.

Students and teachers complete the surveys online at school while parents receive a copy of the survey that can be completed online, or by mail. Parent surveys are returned directly to Alberta Education.

Responses are collected and tabulated into a summary chart released in May and are updated in October to supplement updated academic achievement results through the Provincial Achievement Tests (grade 6 and 9) and the Diploma Examination results (Divisional and First Nations, Métis and Inuit specific). These achievement reports are provided in a separate summary report on our school's website.

This Accountability Pillar Results Report includes our school's overall summary and new results for all survey measures.

Approximate Survey Responses:

- 20 parents in our school responded to the survey. This is down from 22 last year. Unfortunately, low survey responses may not accurately represent our parent population.
- In Parkland School Division, approximately 459 parents responded to the survey. The five-year average for parent responses is approximately 406.
- In Parkland School Division: 2,560 Students (960 in grades 4-6, 700 in 7-9 and 900 in 10-12) responded; this included 76 students who responded from our school.
- In Parkland School Division, 457 teachers responded; this included 21 teachers from our school.

These are approximate numbers as not every respondent answers every question.

Highlights and Celebrations

Woodhaven School continues to celebrate the strong work of staff, students and our overall community.

• After a considerable decline of nearly 30% in 2017-2018 from 2016-2017, teacher and parent respondents indicated an improvement in student attitudes and behaviors in the 2018-2019 Work Preparation Measure. While this is an improvement of over 15% from the previous year, the five-year historical data suggests the 2017-2018 high of 79.9% satisfaction is a statistical anomaly. The 2018-2019 result of a 65.5 % satisfaction rate is in alignment with the 2014-2015 and 2015-2016 results of 66.1% and 64.4 results respectively.

- From an instructional perspective, teachers suggest that satisfaction with opportunities for professional development is on the rise. Next to the Work Preparation Measure, the In-Service Jurisdiction Needs Measure has seen the largest improvement in satisfaction of all Accountability Pillar metrics. The 12.6% increase from 2017-2018's 65.2 is the second highest satisfaction result over the previous five years nearly matching 2014-2015 high of 81.3%. This suggests that the opportunities provided by Parkland School Division continue to meet the professional development needs of Woodhaven's teachers.
- After a decline of nearly 9% in 2017-2018, Woodhaven's Safe and Caring Measure rebounded 3.2% to a respectable satisfaction rate of 75.3%. In part, part of this improvement may be attributed to the implementation of the 'Den Days' initiative. Den Days divided the entire school population into six 'Dens' or houses which compete in friendly competitions intended to instill community and pride into Woodhaven students. The considerable dip from 2017-2018's five-year low of 72.4% is likely reflected in school population decrease of 166 students over the previous year with the opening of other schools in the Spruce Grove catchment area. Specifically, the uncertainty surrounding the reduction of students and staff likely contributed to a heightened anxiety which had an adverse effect on this particular measure.

Parkland School Division's Ultimate Goal is Student Success and Well-Being. To this end, the Board's current Education Plan targets nine assurance elements in student growth, teaching and leading and learning supports.

There are still some areas for growth within our Accountability Pillar Survey results. Woodhaven School is committed to improvement and continuing to learn and grow with our community. For our action items related to this report, please visit our school's Education Plan section of our website.

Areas Requiring Strategic Planning

- While the number of respondents who are satisfied that Woodhaven students model the characteristics of active citizenship increased 1% over the previous year, this measures lags behind the Parkland School Division results by 13.5% and provincially by 21.5%. 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 had the highest five-year average at 67.2% and 69.2% respectively. These Citizenship results are noteworthy in that these years also had the highest participation rates and occurred before the school population was downsized. Between 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 responses to this measure decrease from 622 to 175. Regardless, with the five-year provincial average consistently in the range of 83.0% and 83.9%, the roughly 20% disparity on this measures is indicative that this is an area of growth for the school.
- The Lifelong Learning Measure bears similar results to the Citizenship Measure in relation to provincial and divisional results in that they are lower by 23.9% and 13.1% respectively. The key difference between these measures is in participation rates. The five-year history of this measure ranges between 33 and 46 respondents. This it is difficult to draw specific conclusions due to the low sample size. However the low sample size may suggest an apathy or lack of clarity to what knowledge, skills, and attributes contribute to lifelong learning.
